SeedWISE

SeedWISE is tailored specifically for women DPhil students who are working in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM).

Women are being urged to pursue careers in STEM subjects, where they often excel, but face a huge disparity in achieving success and leadership roles. SeedWISE has been developed to help address this challenge, bringing together women DPhil students from different STEM disciplines at the University of Oxford to meet with women working in industry and commerce, who face similar challenges. We work closely with industry to build mutual relationships, which aims to benefit women both working and studying in STEM roles.

You will learn how to get your message across, so it is remembered. You will learn about timing and when you should deliver key messages. You will develop your self-awareness and understand its role in presenting.

RESEARCH DATA MANAGEMENT (*)

Tue 20th May 12.30-14.00

Research data is often at the heart of scientific projects, it's what you spend hours in the lab generating or in the field collecting. It forms the basis of your analysis and underpins your arguments in papers and theses. But how often do you consider how you're managing this vital resource? Is your data secure and backed up? How can you demonstrate its integrity if challenged? Could your research make a greater impact by sharing data? What happens to your hard-won data when your project ends?

Research Data Management (RDM) considers these questions and more. In this session we introduce RDM and the practical skill of developing Data Management Plans to manage your own data successfully.

SCIENTIFIC WRITING: CORE SKILLS

Thur 22nd May 09.30-17.00

This one-day course provides a sound grounding in the core skills needed to produce accurate and effective scientific writing. The course will include:

- Critique of readability in relevant papers.
- Use of tenses in academic papers.
- Writing with impact.
- Concise writing.
- Grammar and proofreading.
- Scientific table and chart technique.

INTRODUCTION

TO PRESENTATION SKILLS (*)

Tue 27th May 09.30-12.30

The course will cover the key principles of planning and delivering a successful talk, and help to build your confidence. Each subject area in the MPLS Division has its own specific requirements for research presentations. Please note that this course does not seek to address these.

Tue 27th May 09.30-12.30

This session will help you to understand the do's and don'ts of fellowship application. It will guide you through the process and explain the support that is available. A holder of a research fellowship will discuss their application experience.

PROJECT MANAGEMENT: THE ESSENTIALS ()

Wed 28th May 09.30-16.00

During the course you will have the opportunity to manage a project. You will be able to apply the techniques you learn to a project that you bring along. Topics covered: project initiation, managing stakeholders and risk, time estimation, planning.

By the end of this session you will understand more about:

- The importance of planning.
- The tools to make project management succeed.
- How to estimate the time a project will take realistically.
- The skills you need to be a good project manager.





COACHING SKILLS FOR LEADERS (

Wed 28th May 13.30-17.00

Coaching is a highly impactful approach to people development and can support individuals to identify goals, gain insights into challenges, consider options and plan actions. Coaching skills are a valuable asset to leaders and managers and can be useful in a range of workplace conversations, such as feedback, delegation and career development reviews. This workshop will introduce key coaching concepts, approaches and skills. We will explore when and how coaching skills can be used to support effective leadership and management practice. Participants will take part in a practice coaching conversation using real-life examples, topics and challenges.

PUTTING STORIES TO WORK

Thur 29th May 10.00-13.00

This session builds on the introductory workshop Telling Stories that Matter and introduces new elements of great storytelling including metaphor, clarity and message. This highly interactive workshop will be based around an example of writing an explainer or news article for the wider, non-specialist public website.

It is highly recommended that you will have already attended the introductory workshop, or equivalent introductory workshops on storytelling. Brief reading material will be provided to ensure you are up to date with the fundamentals of storytelling that are the basis of this workshop.

SCIENTIFIC WRITING: GETTING YOUR PAPER PUBLISHED ()

Tue 3rd June, 09.30 - 17.00

This course will look at the aspects you need to consider when constructing your paper, and show you what they really want. You will learn how to choose the best journal for your work, negotiate the peer review process and deal with reviewer comments.

The course will cover:

- Why publish and how that affects how you publish.
- The structure of a paper.
- What to include in the title and abstract.
- Open access.
- Impact metrics and citations.
- · Ways to get published more quickly.
- Publicising your paper once it is published.

THE IMPORTANCE OF PSYCHOLOGICAL SAFETY

Tue 3rd June, 10:30 - 11:30

This course equips managers, team leaders, and supervisors with the skills to foster psychological safety—ensuring employees feel safe to speak up, take risks, and collaborate effectively. Learn practical strategies to build trust, encourage open communication, and create a supportive culture that drives engagement, innovation, and high-performance teamwork.





GROW - HOW AI IS CHANGING INDUSTRY FUTURES

Wed 4th June 12.30-14.00

The event will bring together industry experts to explore how AI is reshaping businesses, from start-ups to large corporations. The session will focus on the current impact of AI across various industries, emerging trends, and critical safety considerations in AI development and deployment.

INTERVIEWING FOR PODCASTS

Thur 5th June 09.30-12.30

You are behind the mic, ready to record your first podcast ... but wait! What do you ask? This hands-on training session helps you navigate the world of podcast interviews. The session will cover preparing for interviews, creating a question line, finding your authentic voice and active listening.

Participants will be paired up and asked to conduct short interviews with a fellow participant which will be recorded over Zoom. As a group we'll listen back to them and workshop the interviews for constructive feedback.

This course is aimed at anyone looking at working on interviewing skills as a presenter but is also useful to those asked to be a guest on a podcast.

TIME MANAGEMENT

Tue 10th June 10.00-12.00

An essential skill for researchers. Issues covered will include work- life balance, planning, prioritising, the need to differentiate between importance and urgency, and using a range of strategies and time- saving ideas.

YOU AND YOUR SUPERVISOR ()

Tue 10th June 14.00-17.00

The supervisory relationship is key to the success of your DPhil, and we know that positive and effective relationships contribute to the timely completion of the doctorate.

As with many things, the more you put into the relationship with your supervisor, the more you will benefit from it.

Join Dr Emma Williams for this course which will provide information and introduce strategies to enable you to develop an effective working relationship with your supervisor

This introductory session, tailored to those new to policy engagement, is designed to support MPLS researchers, DPhil students, and professional services staff, in transforming their motivations for impact into a structured understanding of how to get started in academic-policy engagement.

By the end of this session you will have:

- A better understanding of the differences between policy influence, impact, and engagement.
- An enhanced understanding of the policy process at different levels of government (local, regional, national and international).
- An increased awareness of practical tools and strategies to start creating a policy engagement plan.

- What makes a good DPhil.
- Planning to write up your DPhil., structure, content and what makes good writing.
- What the viva will explore.
- What the examiners are asked to consider.

PODCAST YOUR SCIENCE (*)

12th June 09.30-16.30

From inception to publication; this practical session delivered by Emily Elias, journalist and producer of the Oxford Sparks podcast series, is a whirlwind tour through the basics of how to share your research in an engaging manner through podcasting. The session will introduce approaches to podcasting, present inspiration from a range of different podcast styles, and take you step-by-step through the basic technical skills of recording, editing and publishing audio files; you'll have the chance to develop an idea and have a go recording it with support and feedback during the day.

NETWORKING -A STRATEGIC APPROACH (2)

Wed 18th June 09.30-15.00

Being at Oxford provides you with an amazing opportunity to meet a wide range of extraordinary people who could help you and who you could help. This session will enable you to develop this important skill, which will: help you make contacts; discover opportunities; open doors; and speak to the right people. It will also enable you to devise a strategic approach to networking which can have lifetime benefits for you.

Thur 12th June 13.00-16.00

Ready to bring your engagement idea to life? This 3-hour session is tailored to those looking to explore evidence-based strategies for designing activities/events, apply for PER funding, or get practical tips for organising an activity.



Thur 19th June 11.00-12.00

Engagement describes the ways in which we can share our research and its value by interacting with wider public audiences, generating mutual benefit.

In this introductory session tailored to those new to engagement, we look at what public engagement is and some of the reasons why you might want to do it. We'll highlight the multitude of different approaches you can take and provide tips on getting started and where to get support.

LEADERSHIP IN ACTION (

24th, 25th & 26th June 09.00-17.00

Leadership in Action provides the opportunity for you to explore what leadership is, look at some leadership theory, and identify and develop your own leadership style. You will also be able to meet and work with people from other departments and divisions. The course takes a very practical and experiential approach; this means there will be presentations on leadership theory, but for the most part you will actively participate in sessions and activities.
